SOFIA LIGHTS UP THE CAPITAL

Every year, the state's Department of Developmental Services chooses a child to represent over 300,000 children and adults with developmental disabilities who receive services and supports from regional centers and state developmental centers in California, to help the Governor and First Lady light the Capital Christmas Tree. This year, HRC's Sofia Garcia, age seven, was chosen for this honor.

Sofia was born prematurely at 29 weeks gestation and 1070 grams birth weight, and referred to HRC from the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit at Long Beach Memorial Medical Center. To support her development, HRC provided speech therapy services, an infant development program, and respite care services to support her mother, Elia Arizpe. Elia also participated in HRC's parent education programs, to promote Sofia's early childhood development at home.

When Sofia was two years of age, assessments showed us that she should receive a diagnosis of Autism Spectrum Disorder, and she began receiving an applied behavioral analysis (ABA) treatment program.

Since that time, Sofia has made tremendous progress. Sofia now attends second grade in a typical classroom at El Cerrito Elementary School,

where her mother is very actively involved. Her classmates joined Sofia in creating a special holiday greeting card to take along on her visit to the Governor, which included a QR code to play a recorded message from the whole class.

Sofia and her mother were joined to represent HRC by Board President and parent, Mariano Sanz, and daughter Cristina Sanz. They are also well known to many TV viewers as cast members on the Emmy award winning show, *Born This Way*. Together they received a very warm welcome to the Capitol, with a VIP tour, visits to the offices of legislators Ian Calderon, Al Muratsuchi, and Tony Mendoza, interviews with CBS and Univision, and an appearance on Good Day Sacramento.

The show's anchors were quite impressed with Sofia as she practiced flipping the switch to light the trees in the studio, exclaiming, "She's perfect!" Cristina and Mariano talked about her life, their experiences as cast members of a TV show, and her exciting future as an independent young woman supported by regional center services.

Sofia, Cristina and their parents spent some very special private time with the Governor, First Lady, and First Dog Colusa

in his private office. Sofia presented Governor Brown with his Holiday Card, which played the special message from Sofia and her classmates, "Merry Christmas from El Cerrito Elementary School!" Finally the time arrived for the Annual Tree Lighting Ceremony. Sofia and Elia joined the Governor and First Lady on the stage. The governor spoke about the importance of providing services for individuals like Sofia and Cristina through the regional centers. As Sofia turned on the lights on the massive tree, she looked to her mother and to Governor Brown, and beamed with pride. All of us on the team are very thankful to have had this honor to represent the Harbor Regional Center community for this special holiday tradition.

HOPE ADDS MORE AFFORDABLE HOMES FOR PEOPLE WITH DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES

HOPE is doing our part to alleviate the growing affordable housing shortage for adults with developmental disabilities. The housing program serves individuals with developmental disabilities with low incomes. Harbor Regional Center is ensuring that necessary supported living services are provided for the residents, for assistance with activities of daily living such as budgeting, shopping, cooking, medical appointments and other activities to help maintain residents' independence.

New Homes in Bixby Knolls

In May, community members gathered to celebrate the grand opening of a newly renovated eight-unit building in Bixby Knolls. This housing now provides permanent, affordable homes for seven young adults with developmental disabilities. These new residents are living on their own for the first time, in a community integrated environment, with the onsite supports provided by Harbor Regional Center that they need to thrive.

The project was made possible through the collaborative efforts and funding of three parties: The Long Beach Community Investment Company that contributed over \$500K toward acquisition of the property, Harbor Regional Center which created and promoted the concept and is coordinating and funding the ongoing housing program, and SL Start, that is contracted to deliver onsite services to the residents. Additional grant funding for the acquisition and renovation of this housing was provided by Del Harbor Foundation, S. Mark Taper Foundation, Union Bank of California Foundation, Ahmanson Foundation, and Bess J. Hodges Foundation.

HOPE Executive Director Kristin Martin spoke about how this type of housing is meant to be more than shelter. "It should also empower them to make the most out of their lives. Different people need different levels of support to reach their full potential and take advantage of all that life has to offer."

Because of the hard work and contributions made by our community partners and donors, seven very deserving people are now in a position to tackle life's many challenges without the fear of housing instability."

More than 120 guests attended the grand opening to hear Long Beach Mayor Robert Garcia, City Council Member Roberto Uranga, and other community leaders speak about the pressing need for this type of affordable housing. Also on hand were representatives from the offices of Congressman Alan Lowenthal, Congresswoman Linda Sanchez, County Supervisor Janice Hahn, State Senator Ricardo Lara, State Assembly Member Patrick O'Donnell, and Long Beach City Councilmember Al Austin.

A New Home in Norwalk

HOPE's newest home in Norwalk was funded in part through a partnership with the City of Norwalk and the Community Development Commission of the County of Los Angeles. This is now home to three people with



developmental disabilities. Each resident has their own bedroom, while they share common spaces like the living room, kitchen, and yards. Renovations of the home by HOPE included new paint, flooring, laundry room, and a kitchenette.

Residents Emily and Asha were eager to get the keys to their new house. Both moved from their parents' homes. Emily, a graduate of Harbor Regional Center's College to Career program, is now prepared to take this next step toward independence.

Emily and Asha are confident that with a lot of hard work, the encouragement of their families, and the supported living services through Harbor Regional Center they are on the path to success and greater self-reliance.

"We are nervous," Emily's mother Tammy said, "Excited but nervous."

This home is HOPE's sixth housing project in collaboration with the City of Norwalk. Since 2014 they have contributed \$1.5 million in HOME Investment Partnership Program funding to assist HOPE in housing adults with developmental disabilities in their neighborhoods.

For HOPE and Harbor Regional Center, our aim is to ensure that housing instability is never a concern for HOPE residents. Instead, we want them to have the opportunity to focus their energies on personal goals, like increasing independence, becoming contributing members of their communities, fostering personal relations, or finding and maintaining gainful employment. With stable housing as a foundation, we know our residents are empowered to chase their dreams.

HARBOR REGIONAL CENTER TEAMS UP WITH 211 LA AND F.O.C.I.S FOR “PARENTS AS PARTNERS”

Harbor Regional Center, 211 LA County, and Family Outreach Community Integration Services (F.O.C.I.S.) of Norwalk came together last summer at a special leadership summit in Norwalk’s New Harvest Christian Fellowship Church, to prepare for an exciting new ***“Parents as Partners”*** program.

The program brings together parents, regional center service coordinators, parent peer mentors, service providers, public entities, nonprofits, community-based organizations and churches to collaboratively support families for parents who are Spanish-speaking, have children with developmental disabilities, and have had unusual challenges in accessing services.

Patricia Del Monico, Executive Director of Harbor Regional Center (HRC), which serves over 14,000 families in the Long Beach, Harbor, South Bay and Norwalk/Bellflower areas, detailed HRC’s programs and services for children with intellectual and other developmental disabilities like autism, cerebral palsy and epilepsy. She emphasized her staff’s commitment to helping parents navigate the service system by adding trained Parent Peer Mentors, and a stronger safety net with community-organizational partners, to ensure that Harbor Regional Center families are well informed and supported in accessing needed services.

“At Harbor Regional Center we have heard from families about the challenges they face, and we know how valuable it can be to receive support from another parent who has ‘been there.’ That’s why we’re very excited to bring the Parent Peer Mentor program to families in need of a little more support.”

The Parent Mentors Christina Marquez, Maria Orozco, and Osvaldo Robles have now begun to work individually with these selected families, helping them to resolve barriers so that they can put their individual person-centered plans into action.

The ***“Parents as Partners”*** program is building a system of community support that will help parents obtain community-based services and specialized services needed for their children, who have developmental disabilities and are clients of Harbor Regional Center, while providing wraparound support for their families. Parent Peer Mentors are working in partnership with Harbor Regional Center’s Service Coordinators, while receiving strong additional support from F.O.C.I.S. and 211 LA County, to create an enhanced system of support for families and their children. We feel very hopeful, and look forward to seeing the families served by the program experience real results in receiving the services and support that they need.

One big highlight for her was being recognized for her efforts by former President Barack Obama.

"I don't think there is another parent in this world that could be more proud of their daughter," Connie Stewart said.

JOSE PULIDO, ACHIEVER OF THE YEAR



Coming into work at the Northgate Market in Norwalk is one of Jose Pulido's favorite times of day. That's because he knows his work day will be filled with duties he enjoys, like keeping the produce fresh and the shelves stocked. Moreover, he gets to work at a place that feels like a second home, given that he started working there at just 17 years old.

As a teenager growing up in a close-knit family in Bellflower, it never occurred to Jose to find a job at a local market. But due to his struggles with learning in high school, his family felt that a part-time job in a positive work environment would help build his confidence. So his mother and big sister brought him to the Harbor Regional Center. HRC connected him to Goodwill to help place him in a job that would enable him to learn how to thrive in the workplace. A short time later, a Goodwill team leader gave him the good news that Northgate hired him.

In his first year at the market, Jose spoke very little, but quickly learned the ropes and became a productive worker. As a courtesy clerk, he was eager to tackle any tasks that he was asked to do. He also grew in his communications skills with not only his co-workers, but also with customers. His hard work and enthusiasm did not go unnoticed. Last year, he was promoted to a full-time position to work in the grocery department to maintain produce and product placement.

What began as an entry-level job as a teen nearly five years ago has now become a way of life for Jose. He wants to build a long career at the market, and his management will help him do just that. His direct supervisor recently shared that he's honored to work with Jose, who is now considered a bonafied member of the Northgate family.

ELIZABETH INSPIRES MANY

When Elizabeth was a young girl she was energetic, curious and always interested in participating in a variety of activities. Her parents were not surprised when Elizabeth was 12 years old and said that she wanted to join a Cheer Team. Elizabeth was indeed adventurous and while on the Cheer Team she was the brave girl that would be on the top of the pyramid! The last day of the team's practice, Elizabeth fell from the top of the pyramid, landing on the ground – and on her head.

Elizabeth was diagnosed with a traumatic brain injury from the fall. The doctors predicted that she would not improve. Refusing to give up, the family began the long journey of finding appropriate supports and doing everything they could do that might help Elizabeth gain back basic skills such as walking, talking and eating.

Elizabeth began receiving supports through Harbor Regional Center and started working with a physical therapist and other professionals. She has made great strides in the 10 years since the accident. Elizabeth has progressed from requiring a G-Tube which was previously needed to feed her because she could not even open her mouth, to eating small bites that her father fed to her, and now eating on her own!

Elizabeth needed to use a wheelchair for mobility so one area of focus was to help her gain strength and hopefully the ability to walk again. With steadfast determination from everyone around her and extremely hard work on her part, Elizabeth was able to walk with assistance to receive her high school certificate of completion. What a proud moment!

Elizabeth is now attending a day program where she enjoys socializing with her peers, listening to music and singing along. The program also provides opportunities for the clients and staff to venture out into the community on a regular basis for various activities which Elizabeth looks forward to. When accessing the community with her program or with her family, Elizabeth utilizes a walker/gait trainer if she is tired or experiencing any pain. She has made such great progress that she will now usually walk with minimal assistance from a cane!

All of us at Harbor Regional Center are very proud of your many accomplishments Elizabeth!

Todos los años el Departamento de Servicios del Desarrollo estatal selecciona a un niño para que represente a más de 300,000 niños y adultos con discapacidades del desarrollo que reciben servicios y apoyo de los centros regionales y de los centros estatales de desarrollo en California para ayudarles al gobernador y la primera dama a encender el árbol de Navidad de la capital. Este año se escogió para este honor a Sofia Garcia, de siete años y cliente del HRC.

Sofia nació prematuramente a las 29 semanas de gestación y peso 1,070 gramos al nacer. La Unidad de Cuidado Intensivo Neonatal en el Long Beach Memorial Medical Center la refirió al HRC. Para apoyarle en su desarrollo, el HRC le prestó servicios de terapia del habla, un programa de desarrollo para bebés y servicios de relevo para ayudar a su madre Elia Arizpe. Elia también participó en programas de educación para padres del HRC con el fin de promover el desarrollo infantil temprano de Sofia en casa.

Cuando Sofia tenía dos años, las evaluaciones nos mostraron que ella debería recibir un diagnóstico de trastorno del espectro autista y empezó a recibir un programa de tratamiento de Análisis Conductual Aplicado (ABA). Sofia ha tenido una evolución tremenda desde entonces.

Sofia asiste ahora al segundo grado en un salón de clases típico en Los Cerritos Elementary School, en donde su madre participa muy activamente. Sus compañeros de clase colaboraron con Sofia para crear

HOPE AGREGA MÁS VIVIENDAS ASEQUIIBLES PARA PERSONAS CON DISCAPACIDADES DEL DESARROLLO


En HOPE estamos haciendo nuestra parte para aliviar la escasez creciente de vivienda asequible para los adultos con discapacidades del desarrollo. El programa de vivienda sirve a personas con discapacidades del desarrollo de bajos ingresos. Harbor Regional Center está asegurándose de que se presten los servicios de asistencia para la vida diaria necesarios a los residentes y ayuda con actividades de la vida diaria, como preparar un presupuesto, ir de compras, cocinar, hacer citas médicas y otras actividades para ayudar a mantener la independencia de los residentes.

Nuevas viviendas en Bixby Knolls

En mayo se reunieron miembros de la comunidad para celebrar la gran inauguración de un edificio de ocho unidades recién renovado en Bixby Knolls. Esta vivienda ofrece ahora hogares permanentes y asequibles para siete jóvenes adultos con discapacidades del desarrollo. Estos nuevos residentes están viviendo solos por primera vez, en un entorno integrado a la comunidad, con el apoyo in situ por parte del Harbor Regional Center que necesitan para desarrollarse.

Este proyecto se ha podido realizar gracias al esfuerzo conjunto y el financiamiento de tres partes: La Long Beach Community Investment Company que aportó más de \$500,000 para la adquisición de la propiedad, el Harbor Regional Center que creó y promovió el concepto y está coordinando y financiando el programa de vivienda en curso y SL Start, a quien se contrató para prestar servicios in situ para los residentes. La Del Harbor Foundation, la S. Mark Taper Foundation, la Union Bank of California Foundation, la Ahmanson Foundation y la Bess J. Hedges Foundation proporcionaron financiamiento para subsidios adicionales para la adquisición y renovación de esta vivienda.

Kristin Martin, la Directora Ejecutiva de HOPE habló acerca de la manera en que este tipo de vivienda representa más que un refugio. “También debe les da el poder para aprovechar al máximo su vida. Diferentes personas necesitan diferentes niveles de apoyo para alcanzar su potencial pleno y aprovechar todo lo que la vida tiene que ofrecer. Debido al trabajo duro y las aportaciones de nuestros socios y donadores comunitarios, siete personas que realmente se lo merecen están ahora en una

Una nueva vivienda en Norwalk

La vivienda más reciente de HOPE en Norwalk fue financiada en parte por medio de una asociación con la Ciudad de Norwalk y la Comisión de Desarrollo Comunitario del Condado de Los Angeles. Ésta es ahora el hogar de tres personas con discapacidades del desarrollo. Cada uno de los

residentes tiene su propia recámara y comparten espacios comunes como la sala, la cocina y los patios. Las renovaciones de la vivienda que realizó HOPE incluyeron pintura nueva y la instalación de pisos, cuarto de lavado y una cocina pequeña.

Las residentes Emily y Asha estaban entusiasmadas por obtener las llaves para su nueva casa. Las dos se mudaron de las casas de sus padres. Emily, quien se graduó del programa College to Career (De la universidad a una carrera profesional) del Harbor Regional Center, está ahora preparada para empezar el siguiente paso para su independencia.

Emily y Asha confían que, con mucho trabajo, el apoyo de sus familias y los servicios de asistencia para la vida diaria del Harbor Regional Center van camino al éxito y a una mayor independencia.

“Nos sentimos nerviosas”, comentó Tammy, la madre de Emily. “Entusiasmadas, pero nerviosas”.

Esta casa es el sexto proyecto de vivienda de HOPE en colaboración con la Ciudad de Norwalk. Desde el 2014 han aportado \$1.5 millones en el financiamiento del programa HOME Investment Partnership para ayudar a HOPE en la creación de viviendas para adultos con discapacidades del desarrollo en sus vecindarios.

La meta de HOPE y el Harbor Regional Center es asegurarse que la inestabilidad en la vivienda nunca sea una preocupación para los residentes de HOPE. En lugar de eso, deseamos que tengan la oportunidad de concentrar su energía en sus objetivos personales, como incrementar su independencia convirtiéndose en miembros que contribuyan a sus comunidades, fomentando las relaciones personales o encontrando y manteniendo empleo remunerado. Teniendo una vivienda estable como una fundación, sabemos que nuestros residentes tienen el poder para perseguir sus sueños.

EL HARBOR REGIONAL CENTER COLABORA CON 211 L.A. Y F.O.C.I.S. EN “PARENTS AS PARTNERS”

El Harbor Regional Center, 211 L.A. County y Family Outreach Community Integration Services (F.O.C.I.S.) de Norwalk se reunieron el verano pasado en una cima de liderazgo especial en la iglesia New Harvest Christian Fellowship en Norwalk para crear un nuevo programa **“Parents as Partners”** (Padres como compañeros).

El programa reúne a padres, coordinadores de servicios del centro regional, el programa Parent Peer Mentors (Padres Mentores de Padres), proveedores de servicios, entidades públicas, agencias sin fines de lucro, organizaciones comunitarias e iglesias para apoyar conjuntamente a familias con padres hispanohablantes, niños con discapacidades del desarrollo y retos inusuales para tener acceso a los servicios.

Patricia Del Monico, Directora Ejecutiva del Harbor Regional Center (HRC), que sirve a más de 14,000 familias en las áreas de Long Beach, Harbor, South Bay y Norwalk/Bellflower, explicó con detalle los programas y servicios del HRC para niños con discapacidades intelectuales y del desarrollo como autismo, parálisis cerebral y epilepsia. Hizo énfasis en el cometido de su personal en ayudar a los padres a navegar en el sistema de servicios agregando el programa Parent Peer Mentors y una red de seguridad más fuerte con socios de organizaciones comunitarias con el propósito de asegurarse que las familias del Harbor Regional Center estén bien informadas y tengan apoyo para acceder a servicios necesarios.

“En el Harbor Regional Center hemos oído de las familias acerca de los retos a los que se enfrentan y sabemos lo valioso que puede ser recibir apoyo de otro padre que ha ‘estado ahí’. Es por ello que estamos muy entusiasmado en ofrecer el programa Parent Peer Mentors a las familias que necesitan un poco más de apoyo”.

Los padres mentores Christina Marquez, Maria Orozco y Osvaldo Robles han comenzado ahora a colaborar individualmente con estas familias seleccionadas, ayudándoles a superar obstáculos para que puedan poner en acción sus planes centrados en la persona.

El programa **“Parents as Partners”** está creando un sistema de apoyo comunitario que ayude a los padres a obtener los servicios comunitarios y especializados necesarios para sus hijos con discapacidades del desarrollo que son clientes del Harbor Regional Center, brindándoles a la vez apoyo integral para sus familias. El programa Parent Peer Mentors está funcionando en colaboración con los Coordinadores de Servicios del Harbor Regional Center, y recibiendo a la vez un fuerte apoyo adicional de F.O.C.I.S. y 211 L.A. County, para crear un sistema mejorado de apoyo para las familias y sus hijos. Tenemos la gran esperanza y esperamos ver a las familias que reciben servicios del programa experimenten resultados reales en la recepción de los servicios y apoyo que necesitan.

Ir a trabajar al mercado Northgate en Norwalk es uno de los momentos favoritos del día de Jose Pulido. Así que su madre y su hermana mayor lo trajeron al Harbor Regional Center para que se le hiciera una evaluación y se determinó que calificaba para recibir servicios del centro regional. Su nuevo Coordinador de Servicios colaboró con Jose para crear un plan de servicios y ponerle en contacto con Goodwill para ayudar a colocarlo en un empleo que le permitiría aprender cómo desarrollarse bien en el sitio de trabajo. Poco tiempo después, el líder del equipo en Goodwill le dio las buenas noticias de que Northgate le había contratado.

En su primer año en el mercado, Jose habló muy poco, pero aprendió pronto lo básico y se convirtió en un trabajador productivo. Como empacador, afrontó con entusiasmo todas las tareas que se le pidió que hiciera. También incrementó sus habilidades para comunicarse no sólo con sus compañeros de trabajo sino también con los clientes. Su arduo trabajo y entusiasmo no pasaron desapercibidos. El año pasado se le ascendió a un puesto de tiempo completo en el departamento de abarrotes para mantener los productos agrícolas y la colocación de productos.


